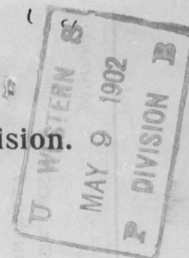

declares that he has no interest in this claim.

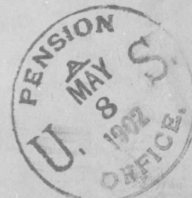
I was acquainted with Gorge Newcomer before
